Just this morning, as I was getting ready for the day, I paused for a moment and thought about how grateful I was that it's summer, and things around the church and the office have slowed down somewhat. I always appreciate these few months when that's the case because it allows me to catch up with many of the things that just get pushed aside until "later" during the busy

months of the year.

AN IMPORTANT NOTICE

PLEASE! PLEASE! PLEASE! <u>If you are someone who has a code for the alarm system at KLC,</u> <u>read the following paragraph</u>:



The alarm system at KLC has been split between the two different buildings. Each building now has its own separate key pad to turn on and off the alarm for that particular building. This means that if you want to enter the office/Education Room building, you need to go into the secretary's office, just like before, and turn off the alarm before opening any other door in that building. If you want to go into the sanctuary, or any of the other rooms in that building, you have to first enter through the makai (ocean) side door by the sound desk and turn off the alarm for that building (a new keypad is located on the wall, just inside the door). Turning off the alarm in the secretary's office <u>WILL NOT</u> turn off the alarm in the sanctuary. The same holds true for turning on the alarm. You need to do so separately for each building. The code you currently have will work for both buildings. Mahalo nui for being very careful with this so that you don't set off the alarm accidentally. In exchange, we will make you a paper bag lunch to take with you on Sunday, July 20th. This lunch will consist of a yummy sandwich, and a side dish, made special by our very own youth who are helping raise money for this project.


