On Thursday, December 24th KLC will hold three Christmas Eve services, beginning at 4:00, 6:00, and 8:00 p.m. The 4:00 p.m. service will be geared toward families with young children, using the "Paper Bag Christmas Pageant", where everyone will receive a paper bag containing items that will allow them to participate in a "do-it-yourself" Christmas pageant. All three services will include the singing of Christmas carols and Holy Communion, along with a variety of special music at each service. Each celebration will conclude with the lighting of candles and the singing of 'Silent Night' as our hula group dances the traditional Filipino 'Pandanggo sa llaw' ('Dance of Light'). Please accept our invitation to join us during this most holy time to worship Christ Jesus as we remember and celebrate his birthday through these worship opportunities.



CHRISTMAS CANTATA

On Sunday, December 13, 2015, we will be offering our cantata, "Love Came Down". This service will be in the form of the tradition of Lessons and Carols that dates back to 1880. David Barber FROM THE PASTOR

I just finished *Learning to Walk in the Dark* by Barbara Brown Taylor, which has helped me prepare for the Advent Season now upon us. She speaks of our aversion to enter the darkness unless it's just a momentary venture. Being in the dark physically, spiritually, or emotionally can be a scary experience especially for an extended span of time. I understand this fear. It's difficult to be unsettled. Not being in control can lead to anxiety. It's painful not to have all the answers to the questions

that keep us awake. The night can exaggerate or bring to light the struggles we have with our faith, our relationship to God, to others, and other concerns that keep us tossing and turning waiting for the light of day. No wonder we want something that will put us to sleep so we don't have to face the terrors of the night and those issues we try to deny.

However, if we're willing to embrace the darkness and not run away from it, this can be a fertile time in which God does the most creative work within us. God will surprise us in unexpected and inspiring ways. Most of all he surprises us with a Son who enters the darkness with us and loves us with an everlasting love. Truly, "the people who walked in darkness have seen a great light."

Do we not have the same quandary with the Advent Season? While people around us are already celebrating the light of Christmas - and the more lights the better, we are being asked to wait in darkness. While the stores and the culture bombard us with the music and the carols of Christmas, we're confronted with some unfamiliar Advent songs and grouchy John the Baptist and his rant of repentance. Not only are we exhorted to "hurry up and get on with Christmas," but we also have those tapes from Christmases past playing in our hearts and heads telling us what Christmas ought to be. There is so much sentimentality wrapped up in this season that it's almost impossible to separate the wrappings of Christmas from the gift of Christmas.

Therefore, this is an invitation to journey into the darkness and the solitude of the Advent Season. Immerse yourself in the symbolism and the experience of these four weeks as you light the Advent candles, listen to the scripture readings, and hear and sing the message of our hope for the "long expected Jesus" through our Advent hymns. Sit alone in silence waiting for God to speak to you through the power of the Holy Spirit without having an agenda or the need to be busy. Use it as a time to prepare for God and for the babe of Bethlehem and not merely as a preparation for the Christmas holiday.

Will you be struck dead if you don't honor the Advent Season? Of course not! We're not talking about your salvation. Jesus Christ is coming into our world no matter what you do in terms of preparation. His advent is not dependent on our efforts. That's the good news. But like any discipline, it may be an avenue by which your faith is nurtured. It may be a channel by which God breaks into your life and enlightens you with some new insights and opportunities. Your journey into darkness may also be a journey of solidarity with all those who are enveloped in darkness and whose lives are filled with sorrow and suffering during this time.

May we give thanks for the Advent Season and experience it as an opportunity through which our hearts and our lives may receive the coming of our Savior Jesus Christ. Therefore, may we wait with hopefulness and expectation for the advent of our God.


PLEDGE DRIVE

CHRISMONS

Chrismons are Christmas decorations with Christian symbols on them. The word is a combination of Christ and monogram (symbol). They help Christians to remember that Christmas is the celebration of Jesus's birthday. They are often used on Christmas trees in churches and Christian homes.

Frances Kipps Spencer of Ascension Lutheran Church in Danville, Virginia made the first Chrismons intending that visitors that came to her church would hear the story of Jesus explained through her original Chrismons.

Chrismons are traditionally colored white and gold – White is the liturgical color for Christmas and symbolizes that Jesus was pure and perfect. Gold symbolizes His majesty and glory. They can be made from many different materials such as syrafoam, plastic canvas, beads, pearls, ribbon, etc.

Here are some symbols that are common Chrismons and what they represent to Christians.

ſ	The Cross symbolizes that Christians believe Jesus Christ died for everyone on a cross	M	The Butterfly is a symbol for transfor- mation and the immortal soul
\propto	The Fish is one of the oldest Christian symbols. The letters, from the Greek word for fish (ichthus) stand for Jesus	Ţ	The Anchor Cross reminds Christian's that Jesus is the anchor of their faith

	The Crown is the symbol that Jesus is King. It shows that Christians believe Jesus is ruler over heaven and earth		The Shell is a symbol for baptism. It reminds Christians of the water that they are baptized on. It is also a sign of Pilgrimage, as Pilgrims to the Holy Land (Israel) would use a shell as a drinking vessel
X	The Dove is the symbol of peace and the Holy Spirit	Ω L	The Lamp and The Candle both repre- sent that Christians believe Jesus is the Light of the world

ADULT BIBLE DISCUSSION



Timothy Keller has published the study guide that is used throughout the series for a set of thought provoking questions and soul transforming answers. 
