BE THE CHURCH FOR AUGUST



ALOHA FROM PASTOR JOEL



It's been a tough year and a half. It's been the most challenging year and a half of my life and of my career as a pastor of Word and Sacrament. The covid-19 pandemic has been an unruly and disruptive occupant in our lives, not unlike a roommate who is always disrespecting your space, always eating your food, and using your things including your toothbrush at times, because they can. The thought of that sends a shiver down my spine. The disruption to my life, our lives, the life of the church that the pandemic has caused has been catastrophic. The world is suffering.

It's easy for us human beings to turn inward during times of great stress, where we feel safe and c omfortable. And it is within that turning inward that we tend to think that all is well and good, and that life should get back to "normal". And it all may be well and good for you/me, but within that narrow perspective of "self" we tend to overlook the fact that other people are suffering and hurting, and life is very much not "normal". And if life isn't normal for the other, if we are disciples of Jesus, then life cannot logically be normal for us because the "other," whoever that might be, is suffering. This is a part of the oneness that we all exist within.

Jesus mandates to us that we are to "love one another". If we are to follow that mandate truly as disciples of Jesus, then there cannot be any turning inward. We must be able and willing to see through the lens of love and grace the perspective of those around us. And we must be willing to accept that person's perspective even if it doesn't match up to our own.

Loving one another during a pandemic means doing what is best for everyone. It means putting another person's needs before our own. It means utilizing grace, forgiveness, and patience with your faith community and its leadership no matter how frustrating things can get.

I understand that we all are desiring a bit of normalcy in our lives and in the life of our church 'ohana. But we are going to have to be patient for a time yet. To bring some of that normalcy back, the worship team, along with myself, have decided to bring back some elements of the liturgy that we all miss from before the pandemic. The synod is recommending that worship services not exceed 45 minutes in length, which is a recommendation that we will be following as best we can. Beginning on August 1, we will be facing what used to be the front of the worship space, processing forward to the altar for communion distribution, and presenting the offering at the altar.

We are also trying to figure out how to best have a coffee time fellowship following worship beginning sometime in the middle of August.

You are a resilient community and I thank God every day for you! Continue to pray for one another, offering support and care. Check in with those people whom you haven't seen in a while and make those reconnections. And of course, love one another as Christ has loved you.

Report from the July Council Meeting

A regular meeting of the KLC Council was held virtually via Zoom with a quorum present. The Church Council is studying <u>Power Surge</u>, by Michael W. Ross. Chapters 4, 5, and 6 were discussed in the hour before the regular meeting, which served as a devotional.

Pastor Joel reported that over the past month he been has been working on his continuing education, and readings. He has done maintenance work at the parsonage. Pastor participated in an online worship experience with Reverend Doctor Roxanne WhiteLight. Additionally, Pastor made phone calls to 21 members, 11 non-members, conducted 4 private baptisms, and 2 weddings in the last month.

Margie reported that KLC received \$794 in offerings in the previous week. The general account balance is \$26,094. The 'Be the Church' fundraising in July focused on Christmas in July for Outreach. \$501 has been raised so far. 'Be the Church' has raised \$2,700 in total. We are grateful for such blessings.

Renee had been on vacation, and therefore did not have an official report for the Council.

Cate reported on the possibility of a local rotary club renting KLC for their meetings. We will know of their decision next month.

The Council elected new officers. Margie Terluin will continue to serve as Treasurer. Holly Pendergast will continue to serve as Secretary. Sarah Dickmeyer will serve as Vice President. Renee Romerdahl will continue to serve as President.

Dave Martinsen announced his resignation from the Council. He and Sandi will be moving to the mainland in August. We are grateful for his service, and will miss his and Sandi's faithful presence in our congregation.

The next regular virtual meeting will be August 17th at 7:00pm.

Trust

"Jesus is not a fund-raiser. He talked about money a lot, but not because he wanted people to give to any particular cause. He talked about money because he cared about us and because he knew that what we do with our money affects who we are spiritually." (Giving to God, Mark Allan Powell, 2006, page 54)



Eleven of the 39 parables are about money. Money/wealth/possessions are mentioned in about 2300 verses of the Bible. God specifically says to give 10% of our wealth to Him first. (Deut. 14:22-23 and elsewhere) But look closely and you will find that there is a spiritual connection to these mentions of wealth. Deuteronomy 14:23 says "In this way you will learn to live in deep reverence before God, your God, as long as you live." (The Message Bible)

We have all been through some rough times these past 18 months. We have all been through some rough times before the pandemic, and for many these rough times continue. When times get tough, we often think first of our financial life because our finances are often the first things affected. It is in the hard times that we must trust the most. It could well be the hardest thing you do, but trust. In good times and in bad. God has your back, always.

I have spent time in the past 30+ years volunteering with groups that provide food for those who can't afford it. It is always amazing to me to hear the people who come for food praising God – sometimes loudly! Where you might expect to see people low and dejected, you instead see people smiling and grateful and full of love for you as a volunteer and especially for God as the ultimate provider. And when there is a jar available for donations, these people who have practically nothing, put in a few coins or a dollar bill to help the organization help others. Somehow, they never lose their trust that He will take care of them, and they want to be a part of taking care of others. It's heartwarming.

So, give to God first. You might be surprised at how well things go for you. Then again, you might not be surprised at all, simply because you trust.



WORSHIP SPACE AND LITURGY NEWS

As you have noticed, we have been changing the seating and areas of the church to accommodate Pacifica Synod, County and State guidelines. We are moving more comfortably into our church facility. The cushioned chairs are back, and we have moved more toward what the interior has formerly been. We will continue to wear masks

as stated by our county and state for indoor worship. We will continue to socially distance, especially inside the facility.

The Pacific Synod has requested that all churches adhere to a service length of no longer than 45 minutes. We are moving toward a full liturgy that will stay within the boundary of 45 minutes. The full liturgy includes additional readings and prayers, as well as music that we had to take out due to the confines of Covid mandates.

Thank you for being such patient and faithful supporters of our church as we will continue to maneuver our worship space to accommodate all that has been asked of us.

COLORS AND THE ENVIROMENT OF OUR CHURCH

There have been comments on the colors used in our church. We have used seasonal colors in our church for many years. The colors have always been used with the cloth that covers the altar table. These colors are throughout the church to help signify the church seasons. When determining the type of materials used for cloth used in churches, the following guidelines are given to us:

- Do the materials serve the liturgy and appropriately express the liturgical season and specific celebration?
- Are the materials "from the people" -- reflective and expressive of the congregation's ethnic cultures, art, and sensibilities?
- Do the materials represent the best the community has to offer, reflecting the gifts and giftedness of the worshiping community?
- Are the materials authentic and real, representing the best of God's good creation?
- Are the materials friendly to the environment? Do they reflect good stewardship of God's good earth?
 Are the materials lovingly made or chosen specifically for your parish needs, rather than purchased from a store or catalog?

The colors serve to adorn the worship space, and to call attention to the nature of the season or festival being celebrated. A brief summary of their usage, according to the church year, follows.

Advent: Blue is associated with Advent, suggesting hope.

Christmas: White, calling to mind the purity of the newborn Christ, and to our light and joy in him.

Baptism of Our Lord: White (see Christmas).

Time after Epiphany: Green is used for its symbolism of our growth in Christ.

Transfiguration of Our Lord: White (see Christmas).

Ash Wednesday: Purple is the preferred color as this is the first day of Lent.

Lent Purple is typically associated with Lent, suggesting repentance and solemnity.

Sunday of the Passion: Scarlet is the preferred color of this first day of Holy Week, as it suggests the deep color of blood.

Days of Holy Week: Scarlet or purple may be used for Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday of Holy Week. Maundy Thursday: For this fourth day of Holy Week, celebrated as the institution of the Lord's Supper, scarlet or white is used.

Good Friday: No vestments or paraments are used on this day, after the stripping of the altar on Maundy Thursday night.

Vigil of Easter: White or Gold suggests of joy in the Resurrection is used on this night.

Easter Day: White or gold is suggested for this day.

Sundays of Easter: White suggests the joy of the resurrection.

Day of Pentecost: Red as the color of fire is used on this day when we remember the tongues of fire descended on the crowd in Jerusalem.

The Holy Trinity: White is suggested, the expression of joy in the mystery of the Triune God.

Time after Pentecost: Green is used, to indicate our growth in faith as we follow the teachings and ministry of Christ.



WAYS TO GIVE

This has been an unusual year in many ways. Although we are worshiping inside and outside the church building, we are still unable to spend time with all of you. Through it all, our work as a church continues. Our staff still works, in fact even more hours, to record worship services and handle daily needs. We "visit" our ohana through phone calls and in other creative ways, help with

needs, collect and deliver food, and all the other things it takes to support the congregation and the community.

Without our regular visitors, with some members choosing to move closer to mainland family, and with job loss on the island as across the country, we are now at a point where the gifts coming to KLC are smaller than the expenses we still have to pay. We have gone through the budget to lower or eliminate as many expenses as possible, many resulting from KLC and other groups not being fully open at this time. We received a Payroll Protection Program (PPP) loan from the federal government to cover payroll for a while, but those funds have been used. We now must rely on contributions, which have begun to lag behind expenses.

We are asking for your help if you are able to do so. Please consider making a donation to the continuing life of KLC. Any amount will help. 


