


# Christmas Eve Service Info

### ALOHA FROM PASTOR RON RUCKER

Aloha from Pastor Ron,

PASTOR First, what can Nanette and I say about your overwhelming generosity and kindness. The food train delivered a variety of delicious meals exceeding

even God's abundance. While on the way to lunch with a friend, Nanette tripped and fell in a parking lot, incurring a compound fracture of her right humerus just above her right elbow. Surgery occurred that night and she spent basically 3 days in the hospital receiving antibiotics to avoid any infection. The bones were realigned but are being allowed to set on their own. She has a brace and is not allowed to travel for 3 months, so our trip planned to start on 12/4 has been cancelled. The surgeon opted not to use plates and screws in her arm due to the poor condition of her bones because of osteoporosis. It is possible another surgery may be required that would probably include the use of plates and screws. Again, thanks for all the prayers, cards, and food.

Father Chris Golding had agreed to do all 3 Wednesday night Advent services and Advent Sundays 2 and 3. He and I have agreed that he would still do those services. Pastor Roxanne WhiteLight co-led and preached at the Thanksgiving service. Pastor Roxanne is also going to participate in and preach during the Advent 4 service. That means I am essentially doing a staycation on island at the parsonage with Nanette. I will mostly be working what little I actually work from home. If you have needs, please do not hesitate to reach out to Cate in the office or directly to me.

Just in case any of you are wondering, you will not see any information from me concerning the Call Committee except for the following: the Call Committee has been appointed and was installed at the December 1 Annual meeting. They have met with JP, the Bishop's assistant for the Hukilau region (Hawaii). In other words, the call process is progressing. All other communications will come from the Call Committee itself.

Sunday, December first, was also the first Sunday of Advent. In some ways, Advent is the gap between what is and what will be. Advent is a place of anticipation and expectancy. The Israelites anticipated and expected their Messiah. They still don't believe their Messiah has come and maybe they are right for them. On the other hand, we Christians tend to think that they just missed their Messiah because they anticipated a different Messiah. In other words, we believe their expectations were in error. Yet today many Christians focus their entire faith experience on the Second Coming, the return of Jesus. What if their anticipation and expectation is in error. What do you anticipate and expect from God? From Jesus? From a pastor? From your KLC ohana? Are any of those expectations in error? Nanette and I are here until you call a permanent pastor. I think you, both collectively and individually, are ready for this next stage, next step in the life of Kihei Lutheran Church. I do encourage you, however, to keep your anticipation and expectation flexible and manageable. God is at work in you. God is at work in a prospective pastor. Let God do God's work. Trust God. Trust your Call Committee.

#### Council Secretary's Report from the December 2024 Council Meeting



A regular meeting of the KLC church council was held in person with a quorum present. The meeting was opened with a devotion and prayer by Marilyn Hop-kins.

Pastor Ron Rucker reported that Chris Golding would be doing the Advent 2 and 3 services as well as the Mid-Week Advent services.

Treasurer Margie Terluin reported that the giving for the week of November 14 was \$16,668. Year-to-date income is \$269,757.40 and year-to-date expenses are \$252,755.75. The balance in the General Fund is \$81,695.55.

Ohana Strong Reports that they are getting ready for the Christmas event/exchange/bus blessing. They will be painting the storage container and installing a light and camera. They are also awaiting final approval for their 501c3 from the federal side of things.

Stewardship reports that over \$185,000 was pledged so far and more people are giving.

The community outreach bake sale raised \$1,000 for special outreach projects.

Irrigation has been fixed in the places that we could see. Things were more extensive than first thought. We are going to continue with the company we found to fix the issue and are figuring out a more permanent fix to what they suggested may be the issue. The solar panels at both the parsonage and church property need to be cleaned. Sue M. has found a company that is reasonably priced and they will be coming to do the work. All were in favor.

The congregational meeting to approve the 2024 budget will be December 1, 2024, immediately following worship service. The agenda was approved and accepted.

A staff appreciation potluck will be held after the budget meeting on December 1<sup>st</sup>. Two gifts will be given from the church to Beth and Cate. We also have other people who work for the church but aren't employee's. A box will be set out with their names and positions so that people can give if they would like to. These people include Sue Whitney (bookkeeper), Cindy (cleaner), and Tori (Media).

Christmas is coming soon so it was suggested that we ask members to park on the side of the building or in the back. We will be marking spots to make things easier and mark sprinkler head.

The next regular meeting will be December 17, 2024, at 7:00 pm, to be held virtually.

It was a lot of work because things had to be dug up in order to find where the leak was. We have some more work do to, but we are hoping to start seeing results in the irrigation bill soon.





# CHRISMONS

We decorate our Christmas tree every year with Chrismons. We will be asking people to add to those to our tree when they come for service starting the third Sunday of Advent. That way, everyone has a chance to help decorate. Here is a little background on Chrismons.

Christmons are Christmas decorations using Christian symbols. The word is a combination of Christ and monogram (symbol). They help Christians to remember that Christmas is the celebration of Jesus's birthday. They are often used on Christmas trees in churches and Christian homes.

Frances Kipps Spencer of Ascension Lutheran Church in Danville, Virginia, made the first Chrismons intending that visitors that came to her church would hear the story of Jesus explained through her original Chrismons.

Chrismons are traditionally colored white and gold – White is the liturgical color for Christmas and symbolizes that Jesus was pure and perfect. Gold symbolizes His majesty and glory. They can be made from many different materials such as syrafoam, plastic canvas, beads, pearls, ribbon, etc.

Here are some symbols that are common Chrismons and what they represent to Christians.
